ELECTIVE OPTIONS (continued)

Instrumental Music (Experienced) (AMI101)

This course emphasizes the creation and performance of music at a level consistent with previous experience and is aimed at developing technique, sensitivity, and imagination. Students will develop musical literacy skills by using the creative and critical analysis processes in composition, performance, and a range of reflective and analytical activities. This course is for students with some previous elementary instrumental music experience who wish to broaden their music education by learning to play woodwind, brass, or percussion instruments.

Instrumental Music (Beginner) (AMU101)

This course emphasizes the creation and performance of music at a level consistent with previous experience and is aimed at developing technique, sensitivity, and imagination. Students will develop musical literacy skills by using the creative and critical analysis processes in composition, performance, and a range of reflective and analytical activities. This course is for students with limited elementary instrumental music experience.

Introduction aux Affaires (BBI10F - French Immersion)

This course introduces students to the world of business. Students will develop an understanding of the functions of business, including accounting, marketing, information technology, human resources, and production, and of the importance of ethics and social responsibility.

Ojibway - Native Languages (LNOA01/LNOA0B)

This course is open to the entire student body and will allow students who have no prior Native language experience to develop an appreciation for a Native language and culture, to explore and experience a unique world view, and to learn to speak a Native language.

Visual Arts (AVI101)

This course is exploratory in nature, offering an overview of visual arts. Students will become familiar with the elements and principles of design and the expressive qualities of various materials by using a range of media, processes, techniques, and styles.

Vocal Music (AMV101)

This course emphasizes the performance of music at a level that strikes a balance between challenge and skill and is aimed at developing technique, sensitivity, and imagination. The course is designed for students who wish to pursue the study of music through singing.

COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT ACTIVITIES

As part of the OSSD requirements, students must complete a minimum of 40 hours of community involvement: activities. These activities may be completed during their years in secondary school and in the summer between Grades 8 and 9. See the link on our website (www.cciwolves.com) for the full details describing approved activities.

These activities may take place in a variety of settings, including not-for-profit organizations, public sector institutions (including hospitals), and informal settings. Students may not fulfil the requirement through activities that are counted towards a credit, through paid work, or by assuming duties normally performed by a paid employee and cannot be completed during school time.

Students will maintain and provide a record of their community involvement activities. Completion of the required 40 hours must be confirmed by the organizations or persons supervising the activities and can be pre-approved through Guidance.

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

LINK CREW - GRADE 9 TRANSITION PROGRAM

GRADE 9 ACADEMIC PROGRAM REQUIREMENTS

The 2 elective options allow for students to try out new subjects and develop knowledge and skills in areas that are of interest to them. We offer an extensive selection of elective options for grade 9 students.

INTERNATIONAL BACCALAUREATE **PROGRAMME**

The International Baccalaureate Diploma Programme is a rigorous liberal education for university-bound students. IB Diploma graduates are exceptionally well prepared for university study due to their breadth and depth of knowledge, and their writing, research and problem solving skills. IB Diploma candidates earn their OSSD through completing the IB course requirements.

FOUNDATION YEARS (Grades 9 and 10)

The Foundation Years program in Grades 9 and 10 provides enrichment and preparation for the International Baccalaureate Diploma Programme. Foundation students preparing for the IB Diploma Programme take Foundation courses in English, French, history, mathematics and science; French Immersion Foundation students substitute Foundation French and history with their Immersion equivalents.

ACADEMIC LEVELS OF STUDY

Mathematics, Science, English, French, Canadian Geography and Canadian History will be offered as either ACADEMIC, Pre-IB or APPLIED courses. LOCALLY DEVELOPED courses are available in English, Mathematics, and Science. All other courses will be offered at the OPEN level. Students may select courses from a variety of streams, taking into consideration the recommendations of their Grade 8 teachers.

Dance (ATC101)

This course gives students the opportunity to apply the elements of dance and the tools of composition in a variety of performance situations. Students will generate movement through structured and unstructured improvisation and identify the function and significance of dance within the global community.

Dramatic Arts (ADA101)

This course provides opportunities for students to explore dramatic forms and techniques, using material from a wide range of sources and cultures. Students will create, perform, discuss, and analyse drama, and then reflect on the experiences to develop an understanding of themselves, the art form, and the world around them.

Exploring Communications Technology (TGJ101)

This exploratory course introduces students to concepts and skills in communications technology, which encompasses television/video and movie production, radio and audio production, print and graphic communications, photography, and animation.

Exploring Technologies (TIJ101)

This course enables students to further explore and develop technological knowledge and skills introduced in the technology program. Students will be given the opportunity to design and create products and/or provide services related to the various technological areas or industries, working with a variety of tools, equipment, and software commonly used in industry.

Geoventure* - Canadian Geography and Outdoor Education (Double Credit)


GEOVENTURE is a two credit program designed to link the expectations of Grade 9 Geography (CGC1P or CGC1D) and Outdoor Activity (PAI101) together into a meaningful and authentic learning experience over a semester of study. Using outdoor skills and community involvement as a vehicle, students will be immersed in learning about themselves as active community members.

Information and Communication Technology in Business (BTT101)

This course introduces students to information and communication technology in a business environment and builds a foundation of digital literacy skills necessary for success in a technologically driven society. Throughout the course, there is an emphasis on digital literacy, effective electronic research and communication skills, and current issues related to the impact of information and communication technology.

^{*}Students wishing to pursue post-secondary studies at university will require academic level courses in the majority of their subjects. Academic courses are appropriate for students working consistently at, or above, Level 2+, 3, or 4 in Grade 8. Students should be independent learners.
